# **Multi-Media Mosaic**

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**Prompt:** Create a black and white sketch and then color using cut outs from magazines or other paper sources. Creation of a color palette. Then in photoshop do the same process digitally.

**Principles:** Students will learn to identify and use a range of colors, digital coloring on photoshop, and learn about using recycled materials.

Descriptive Paragraph: We chose two different mediums to reflect our strengths as artists and what we wanted to teach. Photoshop is a great introductory tool into digital media. It is simple to use to get the students comfortable with using a computer to edit their artwork. Digital media is very popular in the modern world because of the ease of creation and being able to share work. Photoshop can provide a modern way to create a mosaic.
